When I was young my parents would sometimes buy my brother and I toys from the vending machines located in the front of the grocery or department store. Many of these toys I still have today. The toys I have are figures and robots and spaceships; really neat toys that I would play with as a kid.

I have always had a great fascination for all things toy; not only for the nostalgia, but also for the immense creativity and artistry that goes into designing making them.

At some point, as I grew older, I stopped paying as much attention to the quarter machines as I did when I was a kid. When we did go to a store we went in and got what we needed and left and if there was time I would explore the toy isle, hardly ever noticing the vending machines. I'm not exactly sure when I started paying attention again but it was in my junior year of High School when I got my first job. I pushed shopping carts at a brand new Super K-Mart. I must have walked by the vending machines fifty times a day. It was hard not to notice them and I would get a toy every now and then.

But once I moved off and went to college I really started to notice the vending machines. I lived in a big city and there were a lot of stores that had them. So I started to look for them when I would go to any store.

And my collection started to grow.

And it hasn't stopped. I now live in a city with a population of 3500 but within a 60 mile radius I know of where almost every toy vending machine is. And there are a lot more than you would expect. Now if I am in the vicinity, I will go into a store just to check out the vending machine and then leave.

So why paint pictures of these toys? Well....why not.

It started a little over two years ago; I wanted to paint a picture of something but couldn't think of anything interesting until I saw one of my vending machine toys on a shelf by my desk. It looked neat and so I decided to paint a picture of it. It was a small toy still life. After that first one I did a few more because they were so much fun to do. Then —light bulb- I could paint all my vending machine toys! How fun! I could paint my entire collection in the format of still life paintings. It would be a great catalog of my toys and would be more personal than photographs, plus it would be fun to do and I'd get lots of practice painting which can only be a good thing. Once I realized just how many toys I had, I realized it would take a long time to paint them all.

So this book is perhaps half of my total collection.

Now committed to the idea I set about gathering up all of the toys. I had them on bookshelves, in boxes, at work and who knows how many I had given to my kids. Once I started gathering them all up I realized just how many toys I actually had; a lot! Over the years I had acquired quite

a lot of the things. Maybe painting them all wasn't such a good idea after all...

The most important step before the actual painting was making sure I actually had all of the toys. I wanted my paintings to be an accurate reflection of what I possessed. I didn't want to paint a picture of say, a tiny green alien figure from a particular line of vending toys only to find two more of the same line of toys several days or months after I had painted that first figure. I wanted to do all three together so they would be on the same page and not split up. It would make for a more cohesive collection of paintings if all the same toys were together rather than mixed up all over the place. So I didn't start painting until I had torn the house apart and found every last vending machine toy I could. They were in the couch, behind the fridge, everywhere! If you ever want something to disappear just give it to a small child and chances are you will never see it again.

The next big step after the paintings was writing my notes about the toys. I didn't just want each painting to only consist of the painting itself. I also wanted to include the names of the toys, the name of the toy line if there was one and also where and when I bought the toy (if I remembered). Up until this point when I purchased a vending toy I never paid much attention to names or when and where I had bought them, making this step of my project a bit harder.

As for the names of the toys, the internet provided an invaluable resource. I could find most of the information online with some serious digging and surfing. This part of the project was almost more fun than the actual painting. It was really neat to research all these toys and find out what they were called and to see what other toys had come out that I had missed.

I broke the book up into broad descriptive categories and tried to fit the toys in the best I could. I worked on this project over the period of a year and sometimes I would discover new information or facts about a toy I had already painted and would then go back and add the info onto the page. Other times I would acquire a new toy that fit in with one I had already painted so I would have to paint in on a separate page. Sometimes I could fit it on the same page. But you'll recognize both of these instances when you see them in the book.

Also, my collection consists almost entirely of figures. I hardly ever buy any of the jewelry, tattoos or stickers that are also available in the vending machine. I have included one or two really neat rings in the book but for the most part all the paintings are of toy figures because that is my favorite vending toy to collect.

As an artist it is neat to see how my art has changed and improved since I started the project. But since the book is broken into categories instead of placed in the order I painted them it may be harder for the reader to notice as much.

I hope you enjoy my collection of vending machine toys.

The standard I inch capsule






I got these two at HEB in Giddings, Tx on our way to the Round Top Antique Show They're from a line called 'Squisheez'


The top two I aguired at a Fred Meyer Store in Warrenton, OR in 2010.

The bottom one I got several months later somewhere in Texas.





These keychoins are translucent and not the easiest to point...




Jungle Pals




Madagascar 2 figures


Hello Kitty Rainbow Erasers




Got these at a truck stop somewhere between Edna, Tx and Fredericksburg, Tx in March 2012.






